Teaching and Learning 2023 Estimate \$183,233.00

In 2022, class schedules resumed for your **KidSpace** kids, led by Nancy Horstmann and Jeanne Clark. Our youth continued to meet (including a trip to Joshua Tree), and they provided us with a wonderful worship service on Youth Sunday, the first in-person Youth Sunday since 2019! You provided opportunities for adults as well, with the **Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul** event led by John Philip Newell in February, as well as a planned **Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change retreat** led by Nancy Wiens. **Companions on the Inner Way** led many of us in online retreats until they were able to meet at last in person in August.

LifeSkillz groups met and so did interns. We did a lot of "home improvement" projects, so that our classrooms would be put to good use, and **Key Essentials** moved in to three of them in June, helping youngsters learn how to adapt to new learning environments so they can grow and thrive. **Oak Tree D Street** expects to be welcoming preschoolers in October. **Presbyterian Women Circles** continued to meet for Bible study on Zoom.

In 2023, we hope to resume our Sunday morning adult classes, and continue to grow our LifeSkillz and internship programs.

You remember our Christian mandate, to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, welcome the stranger, care for the sick, and visit the imprisoned. (Matthew 25.31-39). You do this directly in congregational ministries, and indirectly as active participants in the Presbyterian Church (USA) where your special offerings support mission around the world, educate leaders and pastors for the future, aid in peacemaking efforts, and pay pastor salaries for underserved churches. The hungry are fed, strangers are welcomed, those ill and in prison (in mind or body) are visited and cared for, and God's word and love spread around the world because of your gifts.

Your Deacons' Food Ministry feed the hungry with bags of groceries, and take food and clothing to the Central City Lutheran Mission. The need for the Food Ministry has grown. - the San Bernardino Elections office provides our neighbors an accessible place to exercise their right to vote right here.
