Artist Statement

I am compelled to create by the healing nature of art. For me, the act of creating allows for introspection in ways that make my internal feelings visible so that I can digest my experiences more easily. These supposed "best years of my life" are full of anxiety and worry for my unknown future and so my current body of work is saturated by my life experiences as I grapple with transforming these anxieties into opportunities for resiliency. It is my hope that my visual explorations will foster opportunities of healing for myself and those who view my work.

Metamorphosis is an installation piece where I invited people from my community here at Gustavus, and at home in California, to let go of suppressed emotions by writing about them on painted book pages. The intent of this participatory piece was to enable participants to get out what they are bottling up rather than letting it fester. I then collected the notes, folding them into hundreds of butterflies so that each participant could be relieved of the weight from their negative thoughts, worries or fears and allow them instead to be transformed into something beautiful.



The Marjorie and Paul Owens Gift

The Church recently received a financial gift from the estate of Marjorie and Paul Owens. Marjorie attended services faithfully, and Paul enthusiastically and generously if only occasionally. The Church clearly was dear to Marj and Paul, and many in the Church remember them as unusually loving, kind, and generous.

Four generations of Marjorie's family were members of First Pres. The Fultons and their children, as well as Marjorie's mother's aunt, were active members, and Marj and Paul's two daughters, Suzan and Sandra, were active as well. The girls attended Sunday school, says Jim Huffstutler, and Melodee Kistner says that the older daughter was in youth group

in high school as well as being in a young adult group with her. Marjorie's grandmother, Bess Elkins, joined the Church after she retired from a long career as a schoolteacher. Jim says she was "a bit of a character" and was "interesting and intelligent," and the two of them occasionally went to matinees together. Long-ago member and church secretary Norma Anderson Zimmer exclaims "Bess was wonderful!" in her "lighthearted attitude towards aging and great sense of humor," adding that Bess was "really fun!"

Marj grew up with her parents and siblings in a house on Baseline and attended Lincoln Elementary, Sturges Junior High, and San Bernardino High School, graduating in 1949. Jim Huffstutler says she was named Miss San Bernardino, possibly in 1949. She met Paul Owens either at a car show or when they both began working for the post office, and they married in 1950. Each continued to work for the post office for many decades, Paul rising to becoming postmaster and Marj working as an administrative personal secretary. They had two daughters, Suzan and Sandra, who lived into early adulthood, but each died in a separate tragic event. The deaths of their daughters -- so beloved! -- were devastating for Marj and Paul; but although they "lived with much sadness," said Wendy in her memorial service for Marj, they "never became bitter." Throughout their marriage they had many interests, most especially cars, dancing, boating, taking cruises, and hunting; and had, by numerous reports, a wonderful marriage. When Paul developed memory issues and moved to Brookdale Memory Care, Marj chose to move with him although she had no mental impairments. "The most important thing to her was to be with Paul," Wendy said at Marj's memorial service, "and she missed him deeply" after he died in 2018. Marj died February 16, 2020, the day before what would have been their 70th wedding anniversary.

Many people shared stories of Marj and Paul's interests, as well as being touched by their great generosity and kindness. Paul, said Wendy at his memorial service from a report from his nephew Melvin, "loved cars and speed." Paul belonged to car clubs, had many cars, and loved to race both cars and boats. But when Sandy Tice said that the Church was in "dire straits budgetarily, Paul sold one of his CARS" and gave the Church a check for half the proceeds. "Several times after that, Sandy says, Paul "sought [her] out to hand over a check above and beyond his pledge," and handed it to her personally "to surprise and delight [her]." Amy Smith recalls the presentation of these checks as well, that "whenever Paul would come, he would stop Sandy as she was leaving the Chancel and hand her a check!" Paul retained his interest in cars even after he was unable to drive; Mindy Rueda, who visited him at Brookdale, told Wendy of a game he invented using radiator belts and fan belts. Kathy Showman, who visited Marj and Paul as a deacon, said Paul was extremely proud of a classic car he restored and "gave [her] a tour of the car " when she visited; the Owens were "very gracious" and even served Kathy a snack whenever she visited. Lynette DuClos Adelson recalls Paul and Marj's kindness to her dad: both of Lynette's parents had unexpectedly been on the same cruise with Marj and Paul sometime in the 1990s; and after Lynette's mother died, Paul and Marj "invited Dad to join them on several cruises. What a gift it was to know that Dad was doing something he really enjoyed!"

Marj and Paul Owens were people who had a great love for each other, for their daughters, for others, and for their Church. Kathy says Marj "loved Paul to the moon and back." Nan Shelton says she "loved them fiercely, called on them often, and admired them so much as they lived with the death of both of their daughters and remained devoted to each other, their marriage, and their faith." Lynette also visited Marj regularly after Paul's death and says that "although she missed him terribly, she was always positive and content with life and grateful for the Church." And we are very grateful to Marj and Paul, people remarkable, said Wendy, for their "faithfulness, generosity, and joy."

At the April meeting, Session approved by consensus a policy for the use of flags in the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. As one Session member said, when we display flags, it will be with intention, respect, and love. The policy is presented here followed by background and information regarding the process and discussions that helped form the policy.

- The Session agreed that the American flag will continue to be displayed in the Fellowship Hall.
- The American flag will be displayed in the Sanctuary at regular worship services only on the weeks of National days of Remembrance: Memorial Day, American Independence Day, and Veteran's Day.
- Our flags can be displayed at memorial services upon request.
- The Presbyterian Church (USA) flag, the Christian flag, and the Scottish flag will be displayed at the discretion of the worship committee.

A Letter from Your Session

For some months, you may remember Session has been discussing the complex issue of displaying a flag (or flags) in our sanctuary. Last fall a member noticed that there were no flags in the sanctuary and asked about it. It turned out that during the pandemic when services were online only, a work crew was changing paraments, banners, etc. and moved the flags into the vestry (where robes, stoles, and tablecloths are kept). There were four of them: the flag of the United States of America, the Christian Flag, the flag of the PC(USA), and a Scottish flag. The flags were stored for more than a year before someone noticed their absence and asked where they were. It became clear that we as a Session needed to consider our policies. We have spent many hours together doing so, and it has been meaningful.

We began by asking, "What are the reasons for having a flag (or several flags) in a sanctuary? Are there ways this might be misinterpreted?" Here are some themes that emerged:

Our Constitution calls for a **separation of Church and State** as a founding principle of our nation. It is right and proper to have flags in courtrooms, which are a part of our nation's justice system; and in public buildings which are supported by our taxes and laws; likewise in schools and public universities. These institutions are accountable to our government, and the flag reminds us of that connection and that responsibility. The Church, however, is accountable to God alone. It is not funded by the public, nor can national leaders determine who shall lead a particular church. At times the church may even be called to critique a policy if the Spirit calls us to do so. In any case, in our country, all are free to worship as they see fit. The US flag does not belong to one religious group, and the first amendment says "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof..." We are concerned that a flag in the sanctuary may send an unintended message that we do not understand this separation. "We are inhabitants of earth and citizens of the commonwealth of heaven," as one prayer puts it.

What the symbol of our flag means depends on the person viewing it. All of us agree that our flag represents the best of our nation and its vision of freedom. One elder offered this quote: "you are what you are because of where you were when." This helped us understand that where and when we grew up, what we saw and learned, and what we have experienced in our adult lives shapes what we see and feel. Each of us has had different experiences with our nation's flag. One elder recalled a spouse flying missions over Vietnam, another recalled watching the Twin Towers fall over and over on TV as an 11 year old. We remembered a flag folded with care and presented to a widow; seeing people waving flags while attacking our capitol; flags held aloft with joy by newly sworn citizens. We honor those who serve without counting the cost, willing to put even their lives at risk for the cause of freedom and democracy. We know those who serve in our military hold our flag with fierce devotion and loyalty, and we are grateful for their commitment. We come from many places and decades, and we hope to be a church that is diverse and inclusive and welcoming.

The word "Sanctuary" literally means "safe place." Our culture is deeply divided and conflicted, and the internet fans the flames of every disagreement. Perhaps the church sanctuary can be a place where we can rest from such conflict and experience something else- Jesus says, "Come to me... I will give you rest". We can move beyond the 'either-or' and welcome a range of political views and theological perspectives. This is a lab where we love one another in Jesus' name. We hope to signal that all are welcome here, and that no one is prioritized nor excluded because of their national affiliation or place of birth. Scripture says that "in Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek slave nor free, male nor female- but all are one in Christ Jesus." We do not need to agree on all things in order to belong to God and each other, in order to be made one. We considered that in our sanctuary a cross, a table, a font, and the Bible remind us of who and Whose we are. One elder said, "I honor the flag, I salute the flag, I love my country- but that is not why I come to church. I come to listen for the voice of God." Jesus invites us to "give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God

Our Busiest Month Ever in the Food Ministry

More people came to our Tuesday and Thursday food giveaways in April 2023 than in any other month in recent years. At 379 encounters, and one more Thursday to go as of this writing, we've exceeded our previous November 2022 high of 371, and we expect our April total to be well over 400.

Those of us in the food ministry have been expecting an increase in March and April because of changes to CalFresh. Emergency Allotments of \$95 for individuals and as much as \$400 for large families added in early 2020 were eliminated this March. In three years, families have come to rely on receiving this extra amount, especially as food costs continue to increase. The allotments also freed limited incomes for other necessities like utilities, transportation, etc.

To prepare for the increase in the number of people coming for food, we've been giving out cold food from Feeding America that weighs (and therefore costs) less, but still has nutritional value. We never know what will be available, but recent cold bags have included items such as lunch meat, Lunchables for kids, hot dogs, cheese, bacon, and sausage. Since our cost is a \$0.19/lb maintenance fee for all the food we get at Feeding America, our cost is lower, and our recipients seem to appreciate these foods.

We also give our recipients a list of other food distribution sites and other resources in the San Bernardino area to access if the need arises.

We expect the number of people we serve to continue to rise over the next several months as families figure out how to handle the loss of the Emergency Allotments they have been receiving for the last 3 years and deal with increasing food and utility costs.

Thank you for your support of food ministry, whether in gifts of time and skill, or Deacon offerings, or specific items of food, bags, or other supplies. Right now, we have a shortage of canned fruit, an item we have been unable to get from Feeding America for some time.
