Mission Assessment Team

Listen-Act-Share

Over the next months, we will include an update from your Mission Assessment Team in each newsletter.

Mission Assessment Team (MAT) Update

The Mission Assessment Team is engaged in evaluating community and congregational information and gathering input from members, small groups, and community partners. The process, congregation, and community are a bit different than during the previous effort 18 years ago. This work is prerequisite to formation of a Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and Mission Action Plan, which will provide insights to the Pastor Nominating Committee and potential pastor candidates.

As we enter this season of Thanksgiving, we are grateful for the efforts on which

- For the work of Luther Seminary professors Dwight Zscheile, Michael Binder, and Tessa Pinkstaff who authored Leading Faithful Innovation: Following God into a Hopeful Future (Apr 18, 2023). Along with our Session, the MAT is exploring the faithful innovation process: Listen, Act, and Share.
 - **Listen** to God, one another, and our neighbors.
 - · Act: Try something new based on God's leading
 - Share: Reflect on your actions and share your story.
- For our leadership and listening practices such as asking, with time to consider, "Where have we noticed the Spirit of God today?" and other moments of intentional observation, silence, and reflection. We trust that you will draw on these practices as we continue to discern God's call.
- For those with the courage to try something new and share what they have learned, who innovated or flexed, by choice or necessity, in response to new situations or needs. For example, all the many ways we have stayed connected and of service during COVID.
- · For each person who has already returned a survey, discussed, or provided input to the Mission Assessment Process, helping discern what God is calling us to do and be in this time and place.

The Mission Assessment Team, says our website, is currently "listening to our congregation and community to discern the mission to which God is calling this congregation at this time and in this place." The Team will draft a Mission Statement, Vision Statement, and Mission Action Plan. These documents will be useful to the "Pastor Nominating Committee and potential pastor candidates about who we are and what we sense God is calling us to do at this time and in this place." Members of the Team were invited to write short bios of themselves so that we can know them better. Along with chair Jim Morris, the team includes:

Mary Bolaños -- Vice Chair: "I was born and raised in southwestern Ohio and moved to the California Bay Area after high school. Mario and I settled in San Bernardino in early 2004 with our (then) three-year-old daughter Lily. I worked for awhile at a tax preparation company but I've really loved being the librarian at a small private PS-8th school since 2008 and added Reading Resource Specialist to my duties in 2021. I started attending FPCSB in 2004 and the family joined officially in 2006. Since then I've been PWC treasurer, Circle moderator, Ruling Elder, and moderator of Nurture, Worship, and Nominating Committees. I love to help with food distribution and I belong to the Kerygma group which studies together on Friday mornings. I am deeply invested in and committed to our church family and welcome the privilege of working on the Mission Assessment Team."

John-Paul Fletcher -- Publicity and Outreach: "John-Paul grew up in San Bernardino, the fourth of eight children. He attended local public schools, graduating from Cajon High School, where he devoted his time to playing water polo, wrestling, and swimming. In college at Claremont McKenna, his love for physics and the deep inner workings of the world took over.

A few recurring themes have dwelled within him; a love for learning, the imagination, and sharing deep thoughts. He wrote poetry and prose for the writing celebration through eighth grade and took a fictional writing class in college. It was the hardest class he ever took; he was a physics and economics major.

After graduating from college he was a substitute teacher before and after joining Americorps National Civilian Community Corps. His nine months in Americorps was one of the most amazing times of his life. He still keeps in touch with his team mates.

Commissioned Pastor Corner

Commissioning

Commissioned pastors are commissioned to particular pastoral service in the Presbytery. I was commissioned by the presbytery to Pastoral Service at First Pres six years ago, though I have been working here longer. The commissioning allowed me to continue to participate in the ways I was, and

also to be able to celebrate the sacraments of baptism and communion and to moderate Session meetings. It allowed me to fill whenever Sandy was gone without us having to find an ordained person to fill in. It also allowed me to fill a role I believe I was called to by God and this congregation. Currently, it is allowing me to fill in as pastor and acting head of staff as we begin the process of finding a new Called Pastor.

Commissioned pastors are commissioned for three year terms, and the commission must be renewed every three years. Three years ago, I was re-commissioned. Now is the time for me to be recommissioned again. Session has strongly and heartily endorsed my commission. When they meet this week, the Presbytery Healthy Pastors and Healthy Congregations Commission will vote on me and should things move forward I will be recommissioned at the November Presbytery meeting here at First Pres San Bernardino. In my self-evaluation for the Presbytery, I mentioned how supportive Steve, the Session, and the congregation have been these last three years and especially these last six months. I have loved this commission and look forward to continuing.

Pulpit Supply

Presbyterians ever were and ever will be Presbyterians. In 1909 Lucy Maud Montgomery wrote in *Anne of Avonlea*, about a Presbyterian pastor leaving the local church, "They are going to call Mr. Allan to Charlottetown and of course he'll accept. It's too mean. We'll be vacant all winter, I suppose, and have to listen to a long string of candidates . . . and half of them won't be any good." This is followed up in the next book, *Anne of the Island*, with this description, "Mrs. Lynde had more time than ever to devote to church affairs and had flung herself into them heart and soul. She was at present much worked up over the poor "supplies" they were having in the vacant Avonlea pulpit. 'I don't believe any but fools enter the ministry nowadays,' she wrote bitterly. 'Such candidates as they have sent us, and such stuff as they preach! Half of it ain't true, and, what's worse, it ain't sound doctrine."

For right now, I am still working part time at the church and part time at the Crafton Hills college, and I am filling the pulpit most of the time. One of the things Personnel and Session are encouraging me to do is to allow other people to preach from time to time. While I still work on the order of worship and communicate with the person doing pulpit supply, it does give me a bit of a break to not write a sermon, and it will allow me to have a Sunday off if I need it. It also allows us as a congregation to hear other voices and get different persepctives. Both Frances Lin and Sam Roberts, whom we heard in October, come from different places and life experiences than I. I do hope that our experience with pulpit supply will be different than Mrs. Lynde's, that we will be fed and encouraged by their presence and words, and that we will welcome them with enthusiastic hospitality.

You might initially think of donors of food & funds for food costs, baggers, Deacons, and volunteers – all very important, and very visible direct contributors to our Food Ministry.

But this month, we want to express our appreciation to everyone who pledges and gives towards the general operating budget. Thanks to you, the food ministry has:

- An attractive well-maintained facility, clean buildings and rooms with shelves, air conditioning & heating, electricity for refrigerators & freezers, lights, safety equipment (e.g. fire extinguishers) & its maintenance, cleaning supplies, locks, alarms & their monitoring.
- A photocopier, ink, and paper for the calendar, monthly announcement, and resource list we give out each time we distribute food. At over 800 encounters each month, that is over 2000 pages each month! Also, a website, on which we also provide this information.
- And mostly, our awesome, brilliant, and supportive staff! Staff more than earn their wages, but also need workman's comp, payroll taxes, training, office equipment, computers & software, office supplies, etc.

Among many, many other things,

- Mimi and Laurie manage the budgets, donations & grant paperwork, food expenses, insurances, phone calls, announcements, calendar, and payroll.
- James maintains our grounds, fixes what breaks or leaks, cleans, coordinates pest control and other contractors, and often lends a hand with unloading food.
- Marlene & Rick supervise interns. And the interns who help with the grounds and the food program are staff too! Rick as our liaison also provides tenants and visitors a calm & helpful presence with an eye for safety.
- Wendy & Steve work with the volunteer leadership to make sure we have sound decision-making, practical and spiritual support, and a healthy well-run, Spirit-centered organization.
- And our worship and music staff? We count on them for the renewal of the hearts of volunteers and staff, to provide the inspiration for the dedication and perspiration.

The food ministry couldn't exist outside of this whole beautiful congregation. Us together.

We will be celebrating 150 years in this community next month. Our neighbors trust us to be here, whether for the food ministry, childcare & youth development, a voting place, a meeting place, or just as a good neighbor with a nicely kept yard.

Each of our favorite beloved ministries are dependent on the core operating budget.

We thank you for pledging so we can plan and for giving so we can serve.
