

On Youth Sunday, the youth talked about the Wild Goose as a symbol of the Holy Spirit. This is the legend they read.

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Legend of the Wild Goose

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Legend states that some of the Celtic believers in the British Isles used the wild goose to symbolize the Holy Spirit instead of the traditional dove. Unlike the dove, which is calm and gentle, a wild goose will attack you and is in essence wild, untamed, and uncontrolled.

In similar fashion, the Holy Spirit is unpredictable – blowing to and fro like the wind (John 3:8) and coming in power (Acts 1:8), disturbing the status quo and setting the people into a new adventure with God.

When you couple this picture of the Holy Spirit with the Shakespearean phrase, "a wild goose chase", you get the recipe for mystery and adventure. The choices and decisions of God may not be those of man – in fact, most likely, people will look at these choices in horror, thinking that you are embarking on a wild goose chase – a foolish adventure that will only end in disaster.

Yet, if the Holy Spirit is the Wild Goose that one chases...well, then everything changes. Things that seem foolish to us become wise in the sight of God Almighty as we trade worldly security for radical obedience, judgment for mercy, and our life for His life.

To chase the Wild Goose is to embark on an adventure within the upside-down Kingdom of Heaven. (From the Iona website, WildGooseChase.org)

A. Our Mission Priorities.

- 1. Theology & Education: Deepen the practice of our inclusive theology that embraces all of God's beloved through an enlightened Christian education that offers theological wisdom with modern understandings, intellectual constructs, spiritual practices, and personal growth tools to equip us to be God's Love in action in our community and our world.
- 2. Invitation, & Innovation: Practice an intentional and renewed spirit of welcome, invitation, and innovation in all activities and groups (internally or externally focused) increasing awareness, participation, and engagement in the church and its missions. Encourage this in leadership, fellowship, worship, and service.
- 3. Senior Ministry: Establish a focused ministry effort to, and in partnership with, seniors, retired, homebound, caregivers, and those living with grief and loss, to intentionally include those vulnerable to isolation. See Appendix D: Senior Ministry and Intentional Engagement.
- 4. Partnerships & Sustainability: Actively seek new and deepened partnerships, and continue to adapt beloved outreach ministries (e.g. Food, SBHS, Water Team, Presbyterian Women), strengthening the base of volunteers, participants, funders, and partners so we have continuity in our service to the community.
- 5. Interfaith Efforts: Increase inter-religious and inter-denominational outreach, dialogue, and collaborative activities, opening us to the possibilities and opportunities for increased service, spiritual maturity, and sustainability through a shared pursuit of Love in Action.

Meet the Pastor Nominating Committee

Our recently constituted Pastor Nominating Committee will be instrumental in helping the church choose a new pastor. The Committee will move through a series of daunting tasks: drafting a statement of what we would want or require in a pastor, sending out a job description and evaluating applications, and then moving to interviewing candidates and making a final selection to be reviewed by the congregation. Several Session members -- Wendy Lamb, Amy Smith, Pat Morris, and Kathy Showman -- were on the committee to choose the Pastor Nominating Committee, and the list of people they nominated was then ratified by the congregation. There are nine people on the Committee; in addition to the six bios that appear below, the group includes Susan Addington and Brian Gano, both of them in the Choir and Bell Choir; and Jim Morris, active with Life Skillz and a co-chair of MAT.

Mary Bolaños: I was born and raised in southwestern Ohio and moved to the California Bay Area after high school. Mario and I settled in San Bernardino in early 2004 with our (then) three-year-old daughter, Lily. I worked for awhile at a tax preparation company, but I've really loved being the librarian at a small private PS-8th school since 2008 and added Reading Resource Specialist to my duties in 2021. I started attending FPCSB in 2004 and the family officially joined in 2006. Since then I've been the PWC treasurer, Circle moderator, Ruling Elder, and moderator of Nurture, Worship, and Nominating Committees. I love to help with food distribution, and I belong to the Kerygma group which studies together on Friday mornings. I am deeply invested in and committed to our church family.

John-Paul Fletcher: I grew up in San Bernardino, with two loving parents and seven siblings. I graduated from Cajon High School then Claremont McKenna College. My wife, Stephanie, and I met when I was teaching math at Cajon High School. We now have four kids and live around the block from the house where I grew up and where my parents still live. For the past twenty years, I have been a commercial loan underwriter, currently for Legacy Bank in Murrieta. My family started attending First Pres in 2011 after attending the September 11th 10-year memorial. Our two young boys at the time already went to the Child Care Center. Stephanie and I have both served on Session. I was chair of the Financial Stewardship Committee, and she was chair of Nurture. Currently, I serve as Treasurer for FPCSB. Outside of church, I have served on the board of LifeStream, the Blood Bank of San Bernardino and Riverside Counties, and have coached and refereed AYSO youth soccer. I like to come to church to reset and recharge.

Kendra Lamb: I grew up in San Bernardino, California, and have been a part of this church since I was two years old. I attended the preschool here and then Norton Science and Language Academy through 8th grade. I'm currently an incoming senior at Arroyo Valley High School, where I enjoy Theatre Company and English class. I am part of a tight-knit family and like participating in bell choir and youth group here at church.

Shelby Obershaw: I was born on a dairy farm in northwestern Wisconsin. I had three brothers, one sister, who is living. Parents passed in the 1960s.

I went to a small town (Clayton) high school where locals and farm kids attended. About 100 students, 23 in my graduating class.

I attended Wisconsin State College at River Falls. Graduated in 1959. In that year, on a 22-degree below zero day, I interviewed for a teaching job in San Bernardino. Didn't look back.

Family today: My sister, Sandra, and Chuck's family. Linda, Lisa, David, and grandson, Jake. (Two deceased, Stephen and Elizabeth).

Work: I was a teacher, junior high and middle school (Highland Jr. High, Fremont Jr. High, and Arrowview Jr. High/middle school) in SB) for twenty years. I taught for the Department of Defense, Air Force, in Germany for one year.

After retiring from teaching, friends urged me to run for the Board of Education in SB. I was elected in 1981 and served for twelve years.

First Presbyterian: I don't remember when I joined, maybe about ten years ago. I served on Elders for 3 years.

Pets: We always had dogs. I now have Minnie, a rescue dog.

Hobbies: I no longer ski, but still play golf once or twice a week. We did a lot of traveling especially in Europe, just driving and exploring, some hiking and skiing in Switzerland. Also, Asia, Japan, Thailand, and China (in 1980, just after it had opened to Western tourists, very interesting) and the Philippines, where Chuck had been stationed in WWII.

Civic: Member of the SB chapter of the National Assistance League. I am now a member of its auxiliary, Les

Confreres. Founding member of the SB City Library Foundation. Past member of SB Symphony Board. I continue to support CSUSB, and SB Community Scholarship Foundation. (Note from Margaret: The Obershaws' generosity to Cal State San Bernardino is unparalleled and extravagant: they have given so much to the university that the dining room in the Commons is named for them, and they completely funded The Den, which provides food to needy students).

A fun activity was volunteering for 3 years in the fire towers of the San Bernardino National Forest.

I moved to Plymouth Village in Redlands two years ago.

Christa Wallis: My name is Christa Wallis and I grew up in Reseda, California, where I lived and attended school until my graduation from Reseda High School. I graduated from UC Irvine with a BA in Spanish and obtained my teaching credential. I met my husband Norm through the friendship of our younger sisters while I was in high school, and we married in 1975. Our daughter Sharon was born in 1979 and daughter Trish was born in 1980. I taught bilingual classes in elementary grades and was a teacher mentor and trainer in Santa Ana and San Bernardino City Unified School Districts. I earned my Masters degree in Marriage and Family Therapy in 2004 and have been a trauma therapist for more than 20 years. We raised our two daughters here in San Bernardino, and I have been a member of First Pres for 44 years. I have served as a Deacon, on multiple committees, Presbyterian Women, in Choir, and have been on the Personnel Committee for over 10 years. I taught Jazzercise for more than twenty years; and I enjoy practicing yoga, spending time with our granddaughters Paige and Parker, photography and traveling with Norm and family. I am honored to serve on the PNC and to assist in selecting our next pastor.

Neal Williams: I was born to Lester and Louise Williams in Edgemont, California. The town eventually became Moreno Valley along with Sunnymead. When I was two years old, they were killed in a car crash and my baby sister and I went to live with Grandma and Grandpa Reynolds in Wainwright, Alberta, Canada. When Grandpa died, I went to live with my grandparents (dad's side) in Fort Cobb, Oklahoma. When Grandma died, I went to a foster family in Crestline, California. My sister stayed with Grandma. We were both adopted by Harold and Irene Williams in Riverside, California. They were our familial aunt and uncle. They were our beloved parents for the rest of our lives.

We moved from Riverside to Rialto and then to Whittier when I was in high school. I then went to Rio Hondo College for an AA degree in geology. As the draft was still in effect, I joined the Navy in 1970. I did basic training and tech school in San Diego and got assigned to a communications unit in Adak, Alaska at my own request. I had always wanted to go to Alaska. After a year there I transferred to Oahu. I was cross trained as a hospital corpsman there and was sent to hike with the Marines in a far-flung SE Asian country near the DMZ. On my return to Hawaii, I had the distinct pleasure of driving for an admiral. I liked Alaska better, but the admiral was great.

After leaving the Navy I returned stateside and moved to Crestline in 1974. I attended Valley College and received an AA degree in biology. I worked for the Crest Forest Fire Department and US Forest Service part-time during that period. I wanted to work full-time with the fire department, and they said I needed to become an EMT-1 to get on. I absolutely loved the course and knew what I wanted to be. I went to work for Sun City Ambulance and went to Loma Linda U for my paramedic course and returned to Sun City, After that I went to Courtesy Ambulance in San Bernardino. Then, since I was still working for Crest Forest, I did get a full-time job with CDF, now CalFire. Crestline had no paramedics at the time and Crest Forest had become part of CDF. I retired from CDF in 2003 after 20 years.

I have remained living in Crestline for 51 years. After retiring I decided to return to church and join a choir. I attended the Lutheran Church of Our Savior until they decided to save money by eliminating the choir and moved on to San Bernardino Presbyterian Church as they had a great choir. I sang with Larry Kistner at an ecumenical service here. I have served on the Building and Grounds Committee and the Session. I have also been a part of the Food Distribution Program and made a lot of noise in the choir.

Simultaneous Saturday Food Distribution & Intern Interviews

The Food Ministry has a busier week each month when we manage all the many parts of our Saturday Food Distribution. Also, every four months, the Intern Interviewing/Hiring team conducts interviews of new applicants and makes the tough decisions of which applicants to place into our limited number of intern positions. This also happens on a Saturday.

On May 18, 2024 we tackled both of these complex activities on the same day since many of our applicants were already planning to assist with Food Distribution. While we learned a few things to make this more efficient, the plan worked well.

Much of the success was due to the number of church volunteers who worked on May's Saturday distribution. The ample Friday crew unloaded and bagged the food we picked up from Community Action Partnership. Saturday volunteers registered participants, kept the tables stocked with food, and helped load food into cars or carts. On Friday and Saturday, more than 40 different people contributed work to the Saturday Food Distribution. This does not include the ones who helped earlier in the week with some of the work that needs to get done before Friday.

Also, our experienced interns have become very capable of performing different food distribution functions, so candidates could take turns being interviewed while another stepped into their role. While conducting intern interviews on Saturday Food Distribution is not the goal, we can make it work, and are better prepared to do this in the future.

Thank you to everyone who helped with the May Saturday Food Distribution. All these efforts helped us provide food to 222 families. And many thanks to our Internship Program Interviewing/Hiring Team for selecting the new team of interns who will start work in June.

Church volunteers make these important community efforts possible.



Adult Education Opportunity: Faith & Politics for the Rest of Us

A pop-up learning community in June 2024 presented by Homebrewed Christianity

The learning community includes 6 mini lectures from leading scholars, 5 livestream sessions with the organizers, Q&A time with the organizers, and online community.

The Livestream Sessions happen on Tuesdays June 4, 11, 18, 25, and July 2 at 10:00 a.m. The mini-lectures will be pre-recorded and released on Wednesdays. The FaceBook group will be ongoing throughout the course.

God is not an American, Jesus loved his enemies, and the Spirit continues to speak life into and beyond the church.

Our contemporary public square is increasingly chaotic, toxic, and repulsive. Yet, our challenges as a people, nation, and species are growing. The rise of Christian Nationalism repulses a growing number of Christians who have a hard time thinking and speaking from a more vibrant theological vision.

Contemporary Possibilities for Public Christian Theology

In Faith & Politics for the Rest of Us, Dr. Diana Butler Bass, Dr. Tripp Fuller, and Tim Whitaker are bringing together a number of alternative theo-political visions to introduce a multiplicity of vibrant, yet neglected traditions in public theology. With the help of some of the most powerful voices in the academy, participants will be introduced to these traditions and get to put them into action as we wrestle with our present moment, discovering the potential for an alternative public Christian witness.

In a time where the public square is increasingly tribal and algorithmically addicted to outrage, over-simplification, and performative politics, a tour of these rich yet neglected theological traditions can inspire and fund a more vibrant Christian voice in the public square as we seek to embody the love of neighbor to which we are called.

This is a course that can be done individually or a combination of individually and in community.

All congregation members are invited to sign-up at the website (http://www.faithandpolitics.net) so you can participate fully. The Nurture Committee is sponsoring this course and made a donation that covers all of us. When you sign up, you can simply mark \$0 for donation. (If there's a chance to make a note, you can indicate that you are with First Pres San Bernardino, but that is not necessary.)
