Mission Action Plan Excerpt

November is National Homelessness Awareness Month and National Homeless Youth Awareness Month.

Homeless Neighbors (from the 2023 San Bernardino County - Continuum of Care Homeless Count and Survey - Final Report). An excerpt from Part 4 of our Mission Action Plan

The increasing rate of homelessness is visible around the church, on the streets, and in our food program. While much about homelessness is hidden, the annual County point in time count is the source of the following data. The 2023 point-in-time homeless count showed a County-wide increase of 25.9% since 2022 and of 98.1% since 2018.

The following chart shows that the number of persons counted as unsheltered and sheltered in 2018 was 2,118 and 4,195 in 2023, which represents an increase of 2,077 persons or 98.1%.




Chart 1. Persons Counted 2018 - 2023

- In San Bernardino City, 1502 homeless persons were counted: 276 in Shelter, 209 in Transitional Housing, and 1017 Unsheltered. 35.8% of the County count was in the City of San Bernardino.
- 32.1% of homeless adults in the County identified San Bernardino as the city in which they first became homeless.



An Eagle Scout in our Midst

About a year ago our Building and Grounds Committee was contacted by Brandon Turner about the possibility of any projects on our Campus that Brandon could submit for his potential Eagle Scout project. Most Eagle Scout projects are done at schools, but Brandon wanted to include our church if possible. After some discussion, it was determined to have Brandon propose a re-landscaping of our garden outside of Fellowship Hall, which has fallen into a state of disrepair. Brandon eagerly decided to take on this project, which we learned cannot just be a redoing of the garden but must include improvements. We expressed an interest in improving this area with a low water drip irrigation system, removal of the existing landscape and replacing it with drought resistant plants allowing us to be continued good stewards of our natural resources. Brandon was required to provide us with detailed drawings of both the irrigation system and future landscaping and make the proposal to the Building and Grounds Committee which was unanimously approved by our committee and Session. Brandon has submitted this proposal to his troop council for pending approval; he expects to hear back on their anticipated approval shortly. Once approved, Brandon is required to only supervise this project not do any of the physical labor himself. Brandon will be arranging all needed

secure a free donation of the irrigation supplies needed from a local company, but we have approved him to set up a booth in the near future during coffee hour to help secure donations for the future purchase of plants and supplies.

I had the opportunity to interview Brandon for this article and here's some information I learned about him. Brandon was born January 2008 in San Bernardino and was baptized in our church. His Mother is Tanya Turner and his Grandmother is Brenda Stringer. Brandon travelled much of his early childhood, from California to Georgia, to Texas, back to Georgia before finally returning to San Bernardino. Brandon joined the Scouts in first grade; from them he has learned many morals and has shaped who he has become today. Throughout his scouting career, Brandon always anticipated becoming an Eagle Scout and evidently almost everyone in his current troop has received their Eagle Scout Badge. Although still in High School, Brandon has career plans to become a professional race car driver specializing in GT-3 class cars. Expect to hear more updates on this project shortly and thank you Brandon for considering our church for your Eagle Scout Project.

Notes from Building and Grounds Committee (from Neal's Minutes)

The Building and Grounds committee oversees all issues with our (older) buildings and our grounds, including items such as Brandon's garden project. These are some of the things Building and Grounds i working on:

- Riding Lawn Mower Dave's neighbor is a small engine repair person. He has looked at the mower and is able to do all the fixes that are necessary. (ed note: this has been completed.)
- · Leaf Blower The two leaf blowers we have currently are a very heavy gas blower that nobody can carry any longer plus a small battery operated one that is wearing out. It was decided we need a new blower. Dave says the cost should be \$329.
- Clean Up The front of the church needs a cleanup to include the removal of the dying agave plants. The cleanup is done yearly by various contractors. Dave has found Yard Guy Larry who will do it for \$1,200. Dave will look into additional options.
- Solar Lights When James comes in at his normal time, it is often dark. He often finds people sleeping by the gates or even approaching him in the dark. Two lights are needed to light the area. Since wiring would be expensive, Dave has looked into solar lights. They would be \$239 for two lights at D street. They will be on poles to prevent theft. He is checking into other prices.

- We roll up our sleeves to donate blood to those in need.
 - -- Deacon's Blood Drive is Sun, Nov 3rd between 8:30 am and 12:30 in Fellowship Hall.
- The San Bernardino Elections office provides a place for our neighbors to exercise their right to vote.
 - -- We welcome voters and poll workers on November 5th.
- The Family Focus Center uses our parking lot to serve a generous Thanksgiving meal to our neighbors.
 - -- This year the event is from 4-6pm on Tuesday, Nov 26.
- Oak Tree D Street provides academics and social and emotional development for preschool children.
- Key Essentials to Behavior Management helps children and adults learn the social skills required to succeed in school and life.
- Over 500 households are served by the food pantry every month.
 - -- Tuesday & Thursday & the 3rd Saturday from 9am-11am.
- Every Saturday, Straight Up AA meets to support people in their journey to recovery.
- The Retired Public Employees meet periodically for meetings and lunches.
- Neighbors walk, jog, or stop and shoot basketball. Thanks to Mark Freeman for relocating the basketball hoop to avoid conflicts and hazards in the west parking lot.

Our D Street Fence and Gates by Rick Rodriguez

The fences and gates on the D Street side of our north parking lot are nearly complete. Mark Freeman has done a great job on this project and will have it 100% complete soon. The gates are working now and we are closing and locking them every night. This is adding a huge amount of security for the church property at night.

The gates are locked at about 7:15 PM on weekdays, except for days when there are meetings at the church in the

evening. On those days they are locked after everyone has left. On the weekends the gates are closed earlier. If anyone ever needs to get onto the church campus and the gates are closed, you can contact Rick to come and unlock the gates. It is best to contact him before you arrive at the church to make sure he is on site.

Many thanks to Mark Freeman for all the hard work on this project that saw quite a few difficulties.



August and September Session Highlights

Amy Smith, Clerk of Session

Session has met the past two months and once again, I'm so impressed with the work done in this church with diligence and cooperation. Stewardship is planning the Fall Stewardship Campaign which you will hear about soon. Buildings and Grounds continue to be hard at work with continuing projects in the Chapel, Meditation Garden, fencing, additional security cameras and lighting and childcare center needs. One moment of grace was seen when a gentleman who used to worship with the Emmaus Church in our Chapel, asked to use that space for a memorial service for his father. Session granted approval, Dave and Rick oversaw the activities and afterward everyone thought it would be nice to be able to open the Chapel for other such uses. Worship Committee has experimented with various ways of serving communion and seating in Fellowship Hall this summer. One exciting development is that Marilyn Kraft's father, Ron, has donated a small organ that can be used in Fellowship Hall for our summer worship. William is dreaming up all sorts of fun ideas, including having a silent movie night with the organ as the accompaniment!

Nurture held a successful Breakfast Church and started the fall KidSpace program. Deacons continue their very successful Food Ministry program which includes work from many volunteers and interns. Donations were made to CCLM and a Blood Drive is scheduled for Sunday, November 3rd. A successful Hot Dog Lunch raised over \$2000 for the intern program which has become so integral to the work of this church.

Mary Bolaños reported on the progress of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). The Ministry Discernment Form (MDP) has been approved by Session and the Presbytery and has been entered into the system which will look for potential matches for our church.

In August, Lily Bolaños reported on her experience as a commissioner to General Assembly. GA was held in Salt Lake City which Lily said was beautiful! All the committee meetings took place online the week before and the second week was in person. Lily noted that the Young Adult Advisory Delegates (YAAD's) were very involved in the meetings although they did not have a vote. Lily was assigned to the International Engagement Committee which focused on Gaza, Guatemala and Cuba. Her committee's issues were all approved through the consent agenda and the things that did come to the floor were intense. Sam Roberts was the Teaching Elder Commissioner from Riverside Presbytery and was the chair of the environmental committee. Their issue which came to the floor involved divesting from fossil fuel companies. It initially passed and then someone spoke on it the next and it was reopened. In the end the original motion failed. The YAAD's were not happy about the reversal. Another major overture was split into two. The first part added LGBTQ+ to the list of minorities included in the Book of Order. The second part would require anyone who was to be ordained be asked if they recognize LGBTQ+ as a minority and accept what PCUSA says (recognizing LGBTQ+ as eligible for ordination). This was eventually approved as amended and now will go to Presbyteries for approval. One overture on gun violence was not opposed but was pulled so many could speak to the issue, and it was approved unanimously. Another overture came from our Synod and requested adding a Korean caucus to GA. This failed because of input from female Korean pastors. Riverside presbytery's overture on Christian Education passed. Kelsey Law was elected to the Advisory Committee for Women and Gender Justice and Carol Stanley (Lake Arrowhead Pres) was elected to the Presbyterian Hunger Program Advisory Committee. Lily commented that her faith in the future of this church was renewed after seeing the passion of the young adults in attendance.

Finally, the church Nominating Committee is hard at work discerning those who may be called to serve as Elders and Deacons. If you are asked, please give it prayerful consideration. God calls us to serve in many ways and we need to be open to hear that call.

"Our place"

While we refer to 1900 N D Street as "our" property and cherish it as the place we gather and serve our community, it is appropriate to acknowledge that this place has a history and an indigenous people who were treated unjustly. The Mission Action Plan includes an introductory acknowledgment as we are engaged, with the help of Nancy Wiens, in the work to develop & articulate a more complete understanding.

From our Mission Action Plan, Part 4: Our Neighborhood, pg. 17

San Bernardino was occupied first by the Serrano Indians, the indigenous people of the San Bernardino highlands, passes, valleys and mountains who share a common language and culture. The San Manuel Band of Mission Indians reservation was established in 1891 and recognized as a sovereign nation with the right of self-government.

First Presbyterian Church of San Bernardino acknowledges that the land on which our facility is sited is the ancestral and unceded territory of the Maara'yam, commonly referred to as the Serrano people. Our histories and stories are intertwined in this space, and by sharing them in culturally appropriate ways, we hope to honor and celebrate our indigenous neighbors and partners.²


Our congregation is in active partnership of Indigenous Revitalization to discover and acknowledge the history of this land - its people, animals, and plant species that may have been displaced. We recognize that every member of our community has benefitted and continues to benefit from the use and occupation of these ancestral tribals and its natural history since the church's organization in 1874.

Life Skillz Benefits

As one of the leaders of the Life Skillz program and an intern supervisor, I see up close the benefits for both the students and for our church. But my own appreciation continues to grow.

The week before our September Saturday Food Distribution, I decreased the number of paid interns for that day to a minimum to cover key roles, as we were between the summer and fall teams and we've been fortunate to have the help of 10 -12 members and friends of the church.

On the two days before our food distribution, I kept getting contacted by Life Skillz students (who had never been interns before), and by interns asking if they could bring Life Skillz friends with them, asking to volunteer at the Saturday Food Distribution. Some just wanted to help their community. A couple of them are applying for the Fall 2024 Internship Program and were curious about what we did at our Food Distributions. In total, 7 Life Skillz kids came to volunteer in addition to the 8 experienced paid interns filling specific roles. I was very pleased to see this large number of teenagers coming early on a Saturday morning (8:00 AM) to help.

On the same day we had an inspection from a representative of Community Action Partnership (CAP), the partner providing the food for our Saturday Food Distributions. The inspection went well. She was amazed by the number of teenagers we had helping that day and complimented the program on its efficiency. I told her about the Life Skillz and Internship Programs and she was very interested in them, as are most people. These programs are not something that you hear about going on anywhere else.

When I started taking her on a tour of our food storage areas, I asked Ariana Aceves to take over for me and make sure things went well and both our vehicle and walk-up tables stayed stocked. I spent 20 -25 minutes with the CAP representative, and she observed how well our teenagers must be trained if I can leave responsibilities to Ariana. I let her know that Ariana was part of the same programs, but she graduated in 2022 and has been working for the church for almost 5 years.

I believe we all are aware that the Life Skillz and Internship Programs benefit the kids in the programs, the church, and our community. But sometimes we may be a little too close and may take the programs for granted, until someone else, like the inspector from CAP, reflects back to us the unique value of these programs. Thank you for your support of these programs.

November 11, Veteran's Day, also known as Armistice Day and Remembrance Day, is the anniversary of the day the armistice was signed to end the Great War, and the day we honor all of our Veterans. On November 10, we will display the US flag in worship, honor those in our community who have served our country in the armed forces, and pray for those currently serving.

Presbytery Assembly Notes

The Presbytery Assembly was held via zoom on Saturday, September 14, 2024. After prayer, there was a presentation by a representative from the Voluntary Organization Active in Disaster

(VOAD) of Riverside County. Formed in 1970, VOAD is a coalition of member organizations to aid in the full spectrum of disaster relief working at national, state, and county levels. San Bernardino County has its own chapter which offers many resources to share with those in need as well as many volunteer opportunities for those who have a need to help. The national website is https://www.nvoad.org/; the site for our county is https://sbcountyvoad.org/ and both sites give excellent understanding of the history, mission, and convenience of this collective for disaster aid.

We received reports from TE Sam Roberts and our very own RE Lily Bolaños who were our commissioners to the General Assembly this summer. Reverend Roberts, who chaired the Environmental and Climate Justice Committee, related the unusual instance of having one of the committee's most important overtures approved, recalled, and subsequently voted down. He also noted that, while our presbytery has some work to do with respect to diversity and inclusion, our denomination "has it right". Lily, who was on the International Engagement Committee spoke about the care with which the committee members and the Assembly itself looks at, discusses, and words the overtures to the point of many times "amending the amendment to the amendments"— really giving a chance for all voices to be heard and valued. She commented on the fierce passion of the many hardworking younger people and especially the YAADs (Young Adult Advisory Delegates) and felt that her faith in the future of this church is renewed.

The El Buen Pastor Administrative Commission is almost finished closing the campus and there is a need to empty the church of all contents. Those items will be available for pick up on October 12th beginning at 9 am.

TE Noel Anderson(Upland) has been reinstated to the exercise of ordered ministry effective 9/6/24.

Frances Lin, our Presbytery Leader on her one-year anniversary, commented that connection has been challenging because of the large physical area of our Presbytery but also that she felt a lot of good work has been begun this year. She also noted that PDA reached out with support for those affected by the recent fires and also that a PDA safety training event is coming -clerks of session will be notified when the date is set.

The new salary minimum for pastors has been approved and will be effective as of 1/1/25. The new salary is in line with the state minimum for exempt and one pastor called it "a justice move".

Other business included:

- TE Martin Smith from Northkirk Presbyterian will be departing ministry in October after 10 years there.
- There will be a retreat for pastors and lay-pastors in Oak Glen 11/11-11/13 and a Confirmation retreat for all Presbytery youth grades 8 through 12 in Big Bear 11/1-11/3
- TE Erin Thomas(Calvary) will again be wrangling Triennium registration and activities. The Youth Triennium will take place 7/28/25-7/31/25 in Louisville, KY –PIM (Partners in Ministry)will have scholarships.
- The assembly elected RE Ann Laudermilk as vice-moderator for 2025 to follow TE Alfred Graise when he becomes the moderator for the year.
- The next PA will be in person on November 9, 2024 at St. Andrew in Indio.
