

But we did not call an interim pastor. I slipped into the position. Now, I'm clearly not Sandy, and I've made subtle changes, but mostly, I know our customs and I've mostly stuck with them. I'm comfortable.

But what happens when we get a new pastor, a called pastor, and they preach a challenging sermon, choose songs we don't know, suggest areas of ministry we should try, or areas we should let go.

Will you want to throw them off a cliff?

You might.

Should you?

Absolutely not!

I'm asking you today to be thinking about this. We don't want out next called pastor to become what they call an "unintentional interim."

Someone who is called as a settled pastor, moves their home and family to the area, and should have a nice long tenure, but gets worn out and run out in a short while because they dare to do the work of making changes and correctives.

I don't want someone to become an unintentional interim because I clung to the status quo. We must be ready for things to be different.

So, once that person comes, and the "honeymoon" period is over, if you notice someone getting ready to head to the mountain with the new preacher, consider practicing saying to them,

"Don't get too close to the edge."

Trust the process and the spirit that brings them to us and give them a chance to do what it is theirs to do.

December & January Session Highlights

Session has met the past two months and accomplished a great deal, as usual. In December we invited the new elders, Neal Williams, Susan Skoglund and Katie Smith, to join the meeting and shared appetizers and desserts prior to the meeting. We approved the 2025 budget which you will see in your Annual Report. Buildings and Grounds (B&G) made a recommendation to purchase seven new inverters for our solar panel system which was approved. We are thankful for the vision of Phil Savage and others who encouraged us to contribute yearly to a repair and replacement fund for this very purpose which means we are not scrambling to find the funds for this almost \$33,000 expense. Session also approved Mimi's request to reduce her work hours to four days a week which means the office will be closed on Fridays. We do not expect any impact because of her reduced hours. B&G reported that a new commercial washer and dryer have been installed using funds donated in memory of Sally Morris and Jennifer Skoglund Shenton. We also approved a retreat for some time in 2025 led by Nancy Wiens.

In January, we reviewed the Spiritual Leadership principles which stress that praying together and being a community of faith and discernment is the most important thing and is central to the work of the Session and the health of the church. Session strives to make decisions by consensus rather than majority rules. We discussed the 2025 budget and the increasing needs to maintain our beautiful but aging campus. We are fortunate that many have blessed us with memorial funds and endowment investments which we can use when needed for unexpected expenses. We elected Corporate Officers: President – Jon Horstmann, Vice President – Neal Williams, Secretary – Amy Smith and Treasurer – John-Paul Fletcher. Deacons report that the Food Ministry is still going strong and Nurture is excited that we have potentially 8 youth eligible for Triennium taking place this summer in Louisville. We may also send a young adult leader or two. Keep an eye out for some fundraisers to help offset these costs.

We end each meeting reflecting on where we have seen God and the Spirit at work during the meeting. Among things mentioned were how well we work together, even when we have differences of opinion; we listen to each other and make sure everyone's concerns are heard; someone is always willing to step up and take on needed tasks, and above all, we can laugh and enjoy each other's company.

Important Items the Food Ministry Needs by Rick Rodriguez, Deacon, Food Ministry

While the Food Ministry at First Presbyterian Church receives a variety of foods through donations from church members, friends, and food bank partners, some of the most useful items can be difficult to acquire.

Cereal is an item that we can get frequently, but we try to put it in every one of our Tuesday/Thursday bags, both "cooking" and "non-cooking". At an average of 660 bags each month, that's a LOT of cereal. Special thanks to Brenda Stringer and her family who bring us cereal on a consistent basis and several times have brought their cases of cereal just when we need it most.

Peanut butter rarely comes in sufficient quantity and frequency from Feeding America, the source of most of our Tuesday/Thursday food. It is especially needed for our non-cooking bags, which are distributed to individuals without access to a kitchen, such as those experiencing homelessness or renting a room. Peanut butter offers a combination of protein, fat and carbohydrates and the least expensive type doesn't require refrigeration. Few other items offer the same practical and nutritional value for non-cooking bags.

"Pop-top" cans of items that can be eaten out of the can without a can opener and without cooking are also very helpful, especially for non-cooking bags. Examples are fruit, tuna, chicken, or other meat. If we have large quantities, busy families appreciate these items also.

Another item that has not been reliably available is beans for cooking bags. It can be cans of refried beans, black beans, etc. or 1-pound bags of uncooked beans.

In sum, we can always use:

- Cereal
- Peanut Butter
- Pop-top ready-to-eat foods
- Beans

Any donated foods help fill our bags. Thank you for continuing to support and help with the important work of our First Pres Food Ministry.

Introducing Our "New" Elders and Deacons

Our "new" officers are not new to being officers in the Church: all eight people, four Elders and four Deacons, have been officers before. Pat Morris will start a second consecutive term as an Elder and Rick Rodriguez a second consecutive term as a Deacon. Susan Skoglund and Neal Williams will be Elders and have been Elders before; Christian Usher has been a Deacon before and returns as a Deacon. Jim Siegmund and Kyle Smith have both been Elders but now have been named as Deacons. And Katie Smith was our most recent Moderator of the Deacons but now will be an Elder. So while most of us probably have some familiarity with these officers, five have submitted bios so that the congregation can know them better.

Susan Skoglund: Susan Skoglund is returning to Session after a year away. She is a past Church treasurer and currently serves on the personnel committee. Susan grew up in Texas, graduated from Singleton High School, attended Baylor University, graduated from Auburn University in Montgomery, and has an MS in Personnel Management from Troy State University in Montgomery. Her husband was a career Air Force officer who died in 1996. Susan has worked in all levels of church governance. She loves to read, to shop, and to spend time with her granddaughters, Addy and Lexi, and great grands, Charlie and Ellis. She is working with the Presbyterian Women Churchwide Board of Directors as Co-chair of the Stewardship Advisory Group. She is a retired Internal Revenue Service Senior Manager.

Katie Smith: I was born and raised in San Bernardino, and grew up attending Del Rosa United Methodist Church. After graduation from PHS, I completed my undergrad in Econ at UCLA and MBA at CSUSB. I worked in the mortgage banking industry for a dozen years before "retiring" to stay home with our two kids. Once Alyson and Kyle were in school, I lectured part-time at SBVC before going back to CSUSB to earn my Education Specialist credential. I then taught Special Education for eighteen years (primarily spectrum kiddos in grades K/1) both in the San Bernardino and Redlands School Districts, before retiring this past June.

I started attending First Presbyterian about fifteen years ago when our son Kyle became involved in FOC. Every once in a while, my husband (David) will attend with me.

Kyle Smith: I first attended First Presbyterian as a guest member of our youth group. My friend Trevor invited me, and I'd jump off a bridge if he asked me to, so I went (and I loved it), so much so that I went through confirmation to become a full member only a year into high school! I have been a member since 2010. After graduating I attended CBU, studying business and psychology. I then went to Northeastern University in Boston, earning my certificate in statistics and data analysis. After returning I served as an Elder on Session and as part of the Stewardship Committee. I spent a year working in insurance and then I moved to Yamanashi, Japan to fulfill a lifelong dream of living abroad and embracing a completely different culture. I loved living in Japan for four years as an English as a second language teacher where I really felt like part of the community. I came home last May and am working at Painter, Smith & Amberg Inc. for my father hoping to learn as much as I can about finance. I am so excited to be part of Deacons and to use what I have learned in the last few years to serve our congregation and community for our Lord's purpose.

Christian Usher: My name is Christian Usher. My family and I have been coming to FPCSB for about thirty years now. My Mom was born in New Jersey; however, as a Navy brat she traveled all over the world but eventually found her way to SCU where my Dad was pursuing a PhD. After completing his PhD my father eventually took a position in San Bernardino at CSUSB. I was born and raised in San Bernardino. I first started preschool at First Presbyteriar; however, for kindergarten, my dad took a sabbatical in North Carolina, where I stayed for a year. We lived in Raleigh, NC. What I remember most about my time there was the woods behind our house, the deep snow that piled up during a blizzard that winter (it was my first time seeing snow and it was about as tall as I was at the time), and the deep blue of the Cherenkov radiation coming off the reactor at NC state. After coming back from NC I started school at California Creative Arts, back before it was called Manuel Salinas Elementary School. After elementary school I then went to Golden Valley. Then after middle school my dad took another sabbatical to Ireland, where I had my first year of high school. I very much enjoyed my time in the Irish school system, and it brought me to reflect on my prior education. After Ireland we traveled Europe, briefly going to Italy, France, and having Christmas in Switzerland. After a year we came back to San Bernardino where I spent the rest of high school at Cajon in the IB program. After high school I studied at CSU Channel Islands where I graduated with a BS in Biology. I volunteered at community hospital in San Bernardino for about a year and a half. I was briefly a deacon before I was accepted into *continued on next page*

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medical school at St. George's University. Since then, I've studied in person and in paper in Granada (West Indies); London; New York City; Wellington, New Zealand; and San Jose, before being offered a pre-match for residency in Hemet. As I write this, I am awaiting my diploma and getting ready to start my residency in Family Medicine. My hobbies include video games, running, rock climbing, and fencing. I have a pet labradoodle.

Neal Williams: I was born to Lester and Louise Williams in Edgemont, California. The town eventually became Moreno Valley along with Sunnymead. When I was two years old, they were killed in a car crash, and my baby sister and I went to live with Grandma and Grandpa Reynolds in Wainwright, Alberta, Canada. When Grandpa died, I went to live with my grandparents (dad's side) in Fort Cobb, Oklahoma. When Grandma died, I went to a foster family in Crestline, California. My sister stayed with Grandma. We were both adopted by Harold and Irene Williams in Riverside, California. They were our familial aunt and uncle. They were our beloved parents for the rest of our lives.

We moved from Riverside to Rialto and then to Whittier when I was in high school. I then went to Rio Hondo College for an AA degree in Geology. As the draft was still in effect, I joined the Navy in 1970. I did basic training and tech school in San Diego and got assigned to a communications unit in Adak, Alaska at my own request. I had always wanted to go to Alaska. After a year there I transferred to Oahu. I was cross-trained as a hospital corpsman there and was sent to hike with the Marines in a far-flung Asian country near the DMZ. On my return to Hawaii, I had the distinct pleasure of driving for an admiral. I liked Alaska better, but the admiral was great.

After leaving the Navy I moved to Crestline in 1974 and attended Valley College, where I received an AA degree in biology. I worked for the Crest Forest Fire Department and the US Forest Service part-time during that period. I wanted to work full-time for the fire department so took an EMT course, loved it, and knew what I wanted to be. I went to work at Sun City Ambulance and went to Loma Linda U for my paramedic course and returned to Sun City. After that I went to Courtesy Ambulance in San Bernardino. Then, since I was still working in Crest Forest, I did get a full-time job with CDF, now Cal Fire. I retired from CDF in 2003 after 20 years.

I have remained living in Crestline for 52 years. After retiring I decided to return to church and join a choir. I attended the Lutheran Church of Our Savior until they decided to save money by eliminating the choir, and I moved on to San Bernardino Presbyterian Church as they had a great choir. I sang with Larry Kistner at an ecumenical service here. I have served on the Building and Grounds Committee and am now on Session. I have also been a part of Food Distribution and have made a lot of noise in the Choir.
