Pastor's Reflection: A Season of Celebrating



"When I was a child, I used to speak like a child, reason like a child, think like a child. But now that I have become older, I've put an end to childish things. Now we see a reflection in a mirror; then we will see face-to-face. Now I know partially, but then I will know completely in the same way that I have been completely known."

-1 Corinthians 13:11-12

I was an extraordinarily mediocre student in high school, academically speaking. Even entering my undergrad at Cal State Fullerton I had asked some mentor-type folks what was the easiest degree to get in college (spoiler alert – at the time it was Communications). Little did I know that God would call me down a winding path through serving within student body government, working in higher education, a food pantry, with Spanish speaking grassroots organizations, then earning a master's degree and finally a doctoral degree. I moved out of and back into my parents' home twice. Got fired from a job, started a family, and found a career that quickly was identified as a calling and vocation. And all of which were evidence of God's movement in and formation of my life for exactly that which I was created. Although high school had its fun and challenging moments, it was no indication of what God would call me to in life. And still, the experiences equipped me for the winding path that would lead to my too being claimed as a beloved of God.

Here at FPCSB we have a long tradition of nurturing and raising our young people in spiritual formation with care and compassion. The youth and their families who are part of the congregation are engaged, committed, and connected to providing spaces for this very act of maturing faith. And, the youth at San Bernardino High School along with members of the congregation desire to know how to develop a sense of identity, character, and integrity. All of these young people have not only been impacted by the members of this congregation, but like the grains of sand on the shore or the stars in the sky, they have been looked to as the generations blessed by God – a blessing to this congregation indeed.

In May we recognized these young people in a few different ways. We were led in worship with the gifts of the youth from the church, heard from and honored the high school graduates of that same group of young people, and recognized the Life Skillz seniors graduating from San Bernardino High School. You can catch a glimpse of these moments in the photos throughout this issue. When we combine the young people engaged with FPCSB (children, youth, and college-aged) over the course of a year, we count over 50 amazingly faithful and gifted people. The Internship Program Continues

The winter/spring internship term ended a few weeks ago (see picture above of winter/spring team) and we have been bringing in interns to do the work needed here at First Pres on Saturdays since then. We will continue to do this until the summer term begins. The interviews for all of the applicants for the summer term will be done on Saturday, June 6, 2026. We have 7 positions in the summer term, 2 team leaders and 5 interns. We have 14 Life Skillz students who turned in applications for these positions. Our interviewing/hiring team will interview all of the applicants and then have to decide who to give the positions to. This is a difficult job, because all of our applicants have the capabilities to be an intern.

There are 4 applicants who have never been part of the internship program before. I believe this tells us they hear, through word of mouth, the internship program is worth their time and is a good program.

As the school year is ending, there are only 3 or 4 Life Skillz students who have never been interns and only 2 students who have never applied for the program. On June 5, 2026 we will have 8 Life Skillz seniors graduating from San Bernardino High School who have come to the monthly Saturday Food Distribution since they joined the internship program, three of these devoted students have been coming since they were freshmen. I am hoping that they will continue to come and help in June and July, but 6 of these graduates will be going away to universities in August. These wonderful young people have been the backbone of our Saturday Food Distributions and so many other things at First Pres for a long time and we have already had them start training younger interns to do the tasks they have been handling. They will be missed.

As things change the internship program continues to move forward.

May Session Highlights

Session continued their study of Roadmap to Reconciliation 2.0 where we explored the concept of preservation and catalytic events. Preservation is the stance where we primarily stay with what we've done in the past and is most comfortable. This can be demonstrated by "we've always done it that way" thinking. We discussed ways we are in preservation mode in some areas of our church life. A catalytic event is something that takes us out of our comfort zone and opens us up to new opportunities and ways of seeing things. Our invitation to host the Splash into Wellness event may be a catalytic event as we open our campus to neighbors in a new way. This is an opportunity to not only be welcoming, but to build relationships and find out what we can learn from these interactions, not just focus on what we might have to offer. (See flier next page.)

Brian shared the pastoral care guidelines which he and Laurie developed to let the congregation know what they can expect in case of an illness or hospitalization. A lease was finalized with Church of Amazing Grace International outlining our relationship as they share our campus on Sunday mornings. Susan Skoglund shared highlights from the Presbytery Assembly meeting, one of which is a planned 100th year anniversary celebration for the Big Bear Christian Conference Center which has hosted so many of our youth throughout the years. It is taking place August 28th – 30th and they are encouraging anyone who has connected with the camp in the past to attend part or all of the weekend. (See flier p. 11.) Finally, Session approved camperships for six of our youth to attend Summer Camp. Much of these funds come from the sale of Stater Brothers scrip on Sunday mornings.

Pastoral Care Coverage

Pastoral care is an integral and important part of the ministry at First Presbyterian Church San Bernardino, as well as the Presbyterian Church (USA). Below is a bit about Pastoral Care from the PC(USA)'s Book of Order:

"All members are called to take part in the ministry of pastoral care, visiting the sick, supporting the weak, and comforting those who mourn. Ruling elders, deacons, and ministers of the Word and Sacrament¹ have particular responsibility for the exercise of pastoral care within the community of faith." W-5.0204

And the call of the pastor even has a specific charge for pastoral care:
"...to exercise pastoral care, devoting special attention to the poor, the sick, the troubled, and the dying;" G-2.0504

When church and community members seek pastoral care:

The church Secretary receives requests for pastoral care. Generally, the Secretary will get permission (or not) to add those names and persons to the Pastoral Care and/or Prayer Chain weekly emails. Notifications of immediate hospitalizations, transfers to hospice care, and terminal or near terminal diagnoses will be forwarded to the Pastor.

The Pastor will make arrangements to visit persons who are hospitalized, those transferred to hospice care, those with terminal or near terminal diagnoses, and those who have just passed away.

When the Pastor is away on scheduled time off:

The Pastor will be notified of deaths and hospitalizations (visit arranged upon return).

The Minister of Pastoral Support will be notified of deaths, hospitalizations, those transferred to hospice care, those with terminal or near terminal diagnoses, and those who have just passed away (visits may be arranged).

Summer Food Ministry Needs

The Food Ministry thanks you for the gifts of food, funds, volunteer time, and prayer. If you are able, we invite your help as some food items are in short supply.

Most Needed Items

- **Canned vegetables — e.g. corn and green beans**
- **Canned fruit**
- **Peanut butter (about 16 oz jars)**

(We currently have enough pinto and black beans.)

Other Ways You Can Help

1. Pray and advocate for our food bank partners

We are grateful for:

- **Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino County (CAP)**, which provides most of the food for third Saturday distributions. The food itself is free; we only pay truck rental costs.
- **Feeding America Riverside | San Bernardino (FARSB)**, which supplies most of our Tuesday/Thursday food and the food for Saturday beyond the 192 CAP bags. Most food is 19¢ per pound, with produce only 6¢ per pound.

2. Give financially

Donations to Deacons or designated gifts help cover:

- FARSB maintenance fees
- truck rentals for CAP and larger FARSB food pickups

3. Continue your regular giving during the summer

Food Ministry operations rely on general offerings for electricity (including refrigeration & air conditioning), office supplies, staffing, and facility use and maintenance.

4. Volunteer

Volunteers do a variety of tasks including:

- sorting and shelving food
- bagging groceries
- photocopying and folding handouts
- assembling kits
- maintaining food storage spaces including documenting temperatures
- registering participants and handing out bags

5. Pray for our participants

As we serve our neighbors we hear both their struggles and celebrations: finding shelter, maintaining transportation, securing enough work, managing health concerns and grief — while also celebrating birthdays, graduations, and other milestones.
