Music Box

When Alexander the Great (356-323 BCE) conquered the greater Mediterranean world in the 4th century BCE (from Greece to Egypt to India) he did two things in particular that changed the Western world: he established a common currency to be used throughout his Empire – so trade exploded, and he established Greek as a universal second language – so the exchange of ideas and knowledge exploded.

He also founded the city of Alexandria in Egypt. Economically it was one of the greatest seaports on the Mediterranean, and was also at the crossroads between Europe/Asia Minor, Egypt, and India.

Furthermore, Alexander's "home-school" tutor was none other than Aristotle (!! 384 - 322 BCE) so he had a profound respect for learning. In Alexandria, freedom of thought and civil debate was encouraged and protected. There were more Jews in Alexandria than in Jerusalem. Philo of Alexandria (20 BCE - 50 CE), a Jew, wrote extensively about how to integrate Plato and Moses. The Christian writer Clement of Alexandria (150 - 215) mentions the Buddha. It was also home to the great mathematician Hypatia (360? - 415) — a woman. Alexandria also featured the greatest library in the ancient world. Indeed, a requirement for ships to dock was that they had to contribute a book to the Library — when books were very expensive.

"Classical" Greek culture had its heyday from roughly the 8th century BCE (Homer) until Alexander, who inaugurated what is known as the "Hellenistic Greek" era. This had its heyday from about the 3rd century BCE to about 30 BCE when Rome conquered Egypt (bye bye Cleopatra). However, as the Roman Empire waned, so did the Mediterranean economy generally, including Alexandria's. Then, in the 4th century CE when Christianity became the official religion of the Empire and dissent was officially suppressed, that included Alexandria. The conquest of Egypt by the Islamic Empire in 641 put Alexander's glorious vision out of its misery.

Although the 'Classical' Greeks (like Plato) thought that getting your hands dirty with the real world was beneath the 'life of the pure mind', apparently Hellenistic Alexandria did not share this view. In Alexandria we see an explosion of engineering and hands-on scientific treatises. One of my favorites has to be Eratosthenes (276 - 194 BCE), chief librarian at the Alexandrian Library, who correctly estimated the diameter of the SPHERICAL Earth to within a few percent apparatus at hand. And 'automata' (simple robots) were invented and built there. Another of their inventions was the pipe organ! By Ktesibios (285 – 222 BCE).

Ktesibios was particularly interested in pneumatics and hydraulics. A key to a workable pipe organ is regulating the air pressure — otherwise the pitch goes wildly up and down. He solved the problem by capturing a bubble of air in a water-filled urn, an air pump fed air into the bubble, and a tube led from the air bubble to the pipes. The weight of the water supplied the necessary 'springiness' to regulate the air pressure. Ktesibios didn't stop there: he also invented a keyboard played with your fingers (a dozen or so notes?) — so in one fell swoop we have a complete pipe organ. He fitted it with aulos-like pipes — the 'aulos' was a loud double reed (think Scottish bagpipes). He called it the 'hydraulis' — from 'hydro' (water) + 'aulos' — whence we get the word 'hydraulics'. Ktesibios didn't just invent it on paper — he built one, and his wife played it.

The hydraulis became quite popular in the Roman Empire — including accompanying gladiator games. (Like the organ at our baseball games?) Even Emperor Nero played it.

It didn't take long for later inventors to add more than one set of pipes, so now you have all the essential features of the modern pipe organ. Later inventors replaced the water-based pressure regulator with a pneumatic one.

The hydraulis died out with the fall of the Western Roman Empire (like so much else). But it was preserved in the Eastern Byzantine Empire. The Eastern Church forbade all instruments in worship, but one was installed at the Emperor's palace to musically announce his comings and goings.

In the 10th century the Byzantine Emperor gave one to the King of France, thus re-introducing it to the West. The Western Church took an immediate liking to it (while still forbidding all other musical instruments in worship). This means that the pipe organ was a secular instrument for some 13 centuries, and a "Christian" one for only 10 so far.

We've seen how Joseph and Jesus lived near Sepphoris – a major pet urban renewal project of Herod's – and likely worked there. Sepphoris sported a coliseum in which games were held. The hydraulis was a common feature of coliseum games. And the hydraulis was so loud you could easily hear it outside the coliseum. Thus, it's plausible that Jesus heard pipe organ music. -- William Zeitler
