✤ we need a miracle today.


We are tired, Lord, of the hurts of this world. We are discouraged in the face of grief, injustice, poverty, indifference.

Music Box

Once upon a time there was a village, next to an enormous waterfall of breathtaking beauty and power. Its ceaseless roar filled the air, nourishing the forests and painting rainbows across the sky. The villagers believed it was a gift from the Divine, a constant reminder of the Ineffable One's presence.

In the village's early days, the waterfall's sound was revered. Elders called it "the voice of the One," a roaring 'melody' so profound it seemed to carry the wisdom of the heavens. Villagers gathered in the evenings to listen, letting the 'cascading symphony' resonate in their very bones. Even children, too young to understand, were hushed in awe, their games forgotten as the thunderous chorus embraced them.

Over time, however, the villagers grew accustomed to the sound. The waterfall became mere background noise. Children played without hearing its rhythm, workers toiled without noticing its rainbows, and its magnificence faded into the mundane.

One day, a traveler arrived, drawn by tales of the great waterfall. As she approached, she was overwhelmed by its roaring song—a melody as if the Cosmic Chorus were singing. She rushed into the village, exclaiming, "How can you live beside such glory? Do you hear it? It's as if the Divine speaks directly to you!"

The villagers exchanged puzzled looks. "Hear what?" one asked.

"The music! The waterfall sings!"

They shrugged. "That old thing? We don't hear it anymore. It's always been there."

The traveler was stunned. "How can you not hear it?" she whispered.

Later, privately, an elderly man explained, "When you live so close to something so vast, it becomes too familiar. The sound fades, though it never stops. It is the paradox of the Ineffable One: the closer we are to Her Radiance, the harder it is to see. We dwell in Her light but cannot look upon it. Instead, we look away."

Determined, the traveler stayed, teaching the villagers to listen anew. Some began to close their eyes and tilt their heads, faintly rediscovering the thunderous song they had forgotten. One evening, she gathered them by the waterfall. The sunset painted the sky, and the roar of the falls seemed to harmonize with the twilight's stillness.

"The Ineffable One speaks through all things," she said. "Not just this waterfall, but every leaf, stone, and breath of wind. Her song is infinite, but we must learn to listen. If we forget, the Radiance will still blaze, but we will walk in darkness."

A boy asked hesitantly, "But how do we listen? The sound is always there, but I don't know how to hear it anymore."

The traveler smiled. "Close your eyes. Feel the ground beneath your feet, the air on your skin. Listen not just with your ears but with your heart."

The boy obeyed, and after a moment, his eyes flew open. "I hear it!" he cried. "It's like it's inside me, too!"

The villagers, intrigued, followed suit. One by one, their faces softened as they reconnected with the forgotten music. An old woman, tears in her eyes, said, "I remember now. My father brought me here as a child and told me it was the voice of the One. I had forgotten... but now I hear it again."

The traveler placed a hand on her shoulder. "The One's song is always with us," she said. "But we must choose to hear it. It is not the song that changes, but us. The more we open ourselves to wonder, the more we will hear it."

That night, by a fire near the waterfall, the traveler told stories of mountains humming with ancient wisdom and forests whispering secrets in the wind. Each tale reminded the villagers that the Divine's presence was everywhere, not confined to any single place or form.

As the stars appeared, the villagers listened—not just to the traveler but to the waterfall, the wind, and the quiet sounds of the night. For the first time in years, they truly heard.

When the traveler prepared to leave, the villagers thanked her. "You have given us back something precious," the old man said. "You have helped us remember."

"The song was always yours," she replied. "I merely reminded you to listen."

Before departing, she left them with one thought: "The Divine speaks not only through the grand and the powerful but also through the small and the quiet. A single drop of water, a blade of grass, a whispered word—all these carry Her voice. If you can hear the roar of the waterfall, you can also learn to hear the whisper of the breeze. Both are Her song."

The villagers watched her disappear over the hill. Though many returned to their daily lives, some stood long by the falls, hearing—truly hearing—its endless song once again. From that day forward, they made time to sit by the waterfall, teaching their children to listen.
