

Why Fast During Lent?

Recently there have been several books and periodicals dealing with the subject of spiritual disciplines, practices or exercises. Each proposes a slightly different list of suggested practices, but fasting is usually included .

In his book, <u>Reformed Spirituality</u>, friend of this congregation, Howard Rice commends fasting because:

- To fast is to remind ourselves that food (or other comforts) are secondary to our attentiveness to God.
- ❖ Fasting is effective preparation for prayer and meditation. Many people notice that their mental state may be somewhat altered while fasting, changing their priorities and deepening their prayer.
- Fasting represents a serious effort to avoid being so possessed by our possessions (comforts) that we are controlled by fear of losing them.

Richard Foster, in <u>Celebration of Discipline</u>, says the primary requirement for undertaking any of the spiritual disciplines is "a longing after God." He declares that the purpose of the disciplines is freedom from "stifling slavery to self interest and fear." Joy, not duty, is the keynote of all the disciplines!

During Lent if you would like to fast with a spiritual purpose, you are invited to join others who will follow this plan during the weeks of Lent:

- Eat supper on Wednesday evening.
- Eat no food until Thursday evening (but drink plenty of fluids).
- Come to Lenten Quiet Nights in the Fireside Room on Thursdays at 6 PM for 25 minutes or so of prayer, quietness and reflection.
- ❖ Break the fast with a simple soup and bread supper following the Quiet Night.
