

Music Box

Kalir was the village scribe, a quiet man whose days were measured in steady strokes of the pen. His hands recorded the life of the village: births and betrothals, treaties and debts.

His writing was the memory of his people.

One spring morning, a stranger came to Kalir's door, offering a vial of ink black as a moonless sky.

"This ink," the stranger said, his voice low, "binds what it touches.

Words written with it cannot fade — not until the stars themselves fall."

Kalir tested it.

A single drop gleamed like a living thing upon the parchment. Moved by awe, he began to use it only for the most sacred records: oaths, vows, and the names of those whose deeds deserved to be remembered forever.

At first, the village flourished.

They trusted the scribe,

for his records carried the weight of eternity.

But slowly, Kalir's heart began to change.

With each stroke of his quill,

he realized he alone decided what would endure.

Quiet pride grew like rot.

One day, a powerful noble humiliated Kalir in the village square, mocking him.

That night, trembling with rage, Kalir opened the sacred ledger. By the flickering light of a single candle, he wrote a lie — a single sentence of venom that painted the noble as a traitor. When the ink dried, it shone like a dark star.

By morning, the lie was believed by all. The noble was cast down, his household scattered. Kalir's hands shook as he saw how easily one false mark had reshaped the lives of many.

In despair, he tried to erase it.

He scraped the parchment until his fingers bled, soaked it in water, even burned it to ash — but each time the words returned,

untouched and gleaming. When he wrote over them, the darkness simply swallowed the new words, leaving the falsehood unmarred.

As the weeks passed, the village descended into bitterness and strife. Kalir saw now that the ink had never been mere magic. It revealed the truth of the writer's heart, giving permanence to whatever lived there — love or malice, blessing or curse.

He sealed the vial and hid it away.
From that day, he wrote only with common ink, yet with reverence and trembling.
For he had learned a terrible truth: all words are eternal.
Whether spoken or written, they sink into the fabric of the world and cannot be fully undone.

And so Kalir became the silent guardian of the village.

For when he lifted his pen, he knew that every stroke was a seed cast into the unseen fields of time — and one day, every seed would bear its fruit. — William Zeitler
