Music Box

She had learned stillness early.

At the School of Unlearning, where most came to shed habits, she clung to inaction with careful devotion. She sat longer than the others, spoke less, and moved only when invited. The masters praised her restraint. The novices admired her serenity. Even the restless found themselves calmed in her presence. She called it devotion. Others called it maturity. She privately called it safety.

Every day she waited for the next instruction, the next sign, the next turning of the unseen wheel that would tell her when it was finally time to act. And so she waited.

It was during a pale hour—neither fully day nor fully night—that the Stranger appeared at the edge of the courtyard. No one saw him arrive. He was simply there, leaning against a column that looked rooted like an ancient oak. She noticed him because he was looking directly at her. Not at her posture. Not at her composure. At her.

After a long while, he spoke. "You wait very well." She inclined her head, uncertain whether this was praise. Then he added, gently, "Waiting can be fear wearing holy robes."

She felt heat rise in her chest. Her throat tightened. "I am patient," she said. "I am obedient." He studied her a moment longer. "Yes," he said. "And you are terrified of choosing."

She wanted to protest, to explain the layers of intention, the discipline, the purification of impulse. But the Stranger was already turning away, crossing the courtyard without haste, disappearing into the night.

That night she did not sleep. A single sentence kept echoing softly through her: Waiting can be fear wearing holy robes. For the first time she questioned the altar she had been kneeling before.

The next morning, without consulting her teachers, without seeking a sign, without waiting for clarity, she acted. Poorly. She spoke—and her voice trembled. She chose—though she was unsure. She stepped forward—while every instinct cried, "wait." Every attempt was awkward. Her hands shook. Her answer was incomplete. Her timing was wrong.

And yet—beneath the embarrassment, beneath the uncertainty, beneath the ache of imperfection, something ignited.

Motion.

A heat she had never allowed herself to feel. She no longer mistook inaction for courage. And she no longer postponed her fire by calling it reverence.
